

Thistle... gone with a whistle.

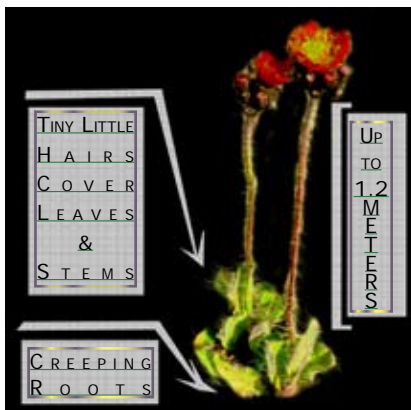

Weed of the Month



Orange Hawkweed

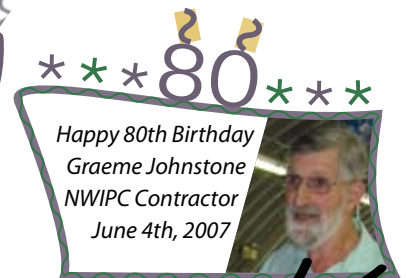
Hieracium arantiacum (Orange Hawkweed) is a perennial. It lays dormant in its roots and blooms in the spring. 14 different species of Hawkweed exist, but this is the only one with orange flowers. It sprouts like a dandelion, but the leaves are very hairy. A tenacious little plant, it can spread by creeping roots, and by seeds blowing in the wind or sticking to animals. Try to remove ASAP. When pulling, break the

earth around the plant and remove any creeping roots. Mowing will not stop it. If your patch is too big to hand pull, call a certified herbicide applicator. Broadcast spraying domestic herbicides may have adverse effects due to the resilience of this plant. Keep watch for any new patches around the original infestation, and find out where it is coming from. Call 1-866-449-3337 to report this high-priority weed.

Beautiful Buck Flats Field Day

The local 4H Clubs and the community of Houston BC came together to slow the spread of field scabious in Buck Flats, an area 25 minutes south of Houston. Wendy Siemens (noxious weed control contractor) said, "this whole area was flooded last week, and now it's covered in field scabious." People met at Buck Creek Bridge #2 on Monday, June 25th. Fifty fun-filled kids and parents pulled plants in the most sensitive areas. No herbicide spraying is allowed along the

ecologically important Buck Creek banks, so the only way to remove weeds is to *get-down-and-dirty* and pull them out of the ground. The NWIPC was there to help out with tools and some incentives. All participants were given free "Got weeds?" t-shirts or hats. Prizes were given to kids for finding the scabious with the largest shoot or root. A BBQ was prepared to feed all the weed warriors. Thanks to all helpers, and keep an ear out for next year's Buck Flats field day.
